


CURRENT SEASON

MEMBERS

We are sad to record the death of long standing member Antony Foster. A tribute to him appears elsewhere in this magazine, along with his final game of chess completed just a few days before his death. Being fairly local I was able to attend his funeral at St Jude's, Halifax, and meet some of his family. Antony had planned the funeral himself and it reflected his firm hope in the resurrection.

SCHEMING MIND CURRENT AND COMPLETED GAMES

One member asked a question about why he had some Completed Games still in his Current Games section on Scheming Mind. On the basis that if one person asks a question, several others probably have the same question but haven't asked, I referred it to the Site Owner and this was his reply:

If your opponent enters a message in a game after it has finished, it continues to show in your current games list with a highlight. If you look at the game and read the messages, then the game will disappear from your list of current games, not necessarily immediately, but it will be gone the next time you log on to the site.

SCHEMING MIND CHESS LEAGUE

We completed our final match in Season Fourteen with a $6\frac{1}{2}$ - $3\frac{1}{2}$ victory over Dreadnoughts and so finished 3rd in the Division, which well exceeded our expectations in this higher Division. Congratulations to the Team that achieved this excellent result. Because of this we remain in Division 3 for Season 15 which has now begun. We lost our first match $1\frac{1}{2}$ - $8\frac{1}{2}$ to The Chess Masters B Team, but they were in a higher Division last season. Looking down from heaven at Notre Dame

Recollections of David Lowe by Richard Cleaves

I'm sure there's more to it than that! Returning to Bridgend on the train from a preaching engagement in Maesteg, I was reading a review of the restoration of Notre Dame by the Observer's architecture critic. Commenting on the way Notre Dame now 'reverberates with light', Rowan Moore, a self-professed unbeliever, was sure, 'It's impossible not to be moved'. My eye fell on his assessment of Guillaume Bardet's altar, lectern, cathedra with seats, tabernacle and baptistery: 'simple and modern'.




There's surely more to it than that, I thought, as my mind turned to the Clergy Correspondence Chess Club. I recalled regular games with the late David Lowe, most if not all of which I lost, and a piece he contributed to *Chess Minister* describing a three-month sabbatical he took 30 years ago at the beginning of 1995. Intrigued, I sent for the booklet he produced at the end of his sabbatical: *Nervous Breakdown in Italy, a Sabbatical Look at Liturgy and Architecture*. Vicar of a Victorian parish church with pews for a thousand people, he had a vision for the future of the church building he wanted to share.

The church is the people and the church building is for the people. The church building is for Christians gathered together for the worship of God. It follows that church architecture and the ordering of furniture inside the building is important because it provides the setting for the way we worship God.

The first part of the sabbatical was taken at Carlow, the Irish Institute of Pastoral Liturgy where David researched the connection between liturgy and architecture in the light of the reforms of the second Vatican Council and the Liturgical Movement. The next month was spent on a grand tour of Italian churches in the company of architect, parishioner and friend, Simon Merrett. David made notes and Simon sketched the way each church had responded to the move from a 'high altar', distant from the people, to a 'central table' around which the people of God gather for mass. Returning home, David then wrote up his reflections and finished his booklet with a plan for St Margaret's.

The removal of the pews would enable an altar table to be placed at 'the crossing', on three sides of which the congregation could sit. This is precisely the arrangement of the restored Notre Dame. The key furnishings are not just 'simple and modern': they express a liturgy which, in the words of Michael Perham's preface to David Lowe's booklet, will keep drawing the community of the church together and also 'give them a glimpse of the community of heaven where true worship is to be found'.

In an obituary in the parish magazine in February 2021, Simon Merrett recalls David's return as 'an honorary guest at the service of rededication to witness the realisation of his brilliant vision for our church'. It was a vision, he suggests, that has gone on to 'inspire new and creative ways of drawing our community together'.



In his sabbatical booklet, David, had feared he would not live to see his plans realised; he anticipated 'looking down with interest from heaven'. Maybe he's been doing just that at the re-opening of Notre Dame!

ANTONY FOSTER (1939-2024)

Antony was born in St. Albans and educated there and at Cambridge, where he read Natural Sciences then Theology. He became a CMS missionary teacher in Western Nigeria, where he also ran a chess club, having originally been taught the game by his father. He trained for Ministry at Ridley Hall, being ordained in Wakefield Cathedral and serving as curate of Sandal Magna, before returning to Africa, this time to Uganda where he was Chaplain and head of Chemistry at a College in Soroti. In 1974 he returned to the UK for the education of their children and he became Vicar of Christ Church, Mount Pellon in Halifax, remaining in that town when he took early retirement on health grounds. He captained a chess team in the Calderdale League for a few years and regularly entered The Times chess problem competition, winning it at least once to my knowledge. He also did that newspaper's cryptic crossword most days.


He was married to Juliet for just short of 60 years. They met on the 2 week sea voyage to Nigeria, and arrived in Africa engaged. She survives him, though now very frail and living in a Care Home, along with their son and two daughters. His funeral, in St Jude's, Halifax, where he had worshipped and helped out since his retirement, was planned by Antony himself and was full of the hope of the resurrection we have in Jesus Christ.

[The last issue of CHESS Minister! contained two games between Bruce Carlin and Antony Foster. As it happened Antony never saw the magazine as he died suddenly while it was in the post to him. Just a week or two before he died we played what turned out to be our last game, and it turned out to be something of a marathon. I offer only brief notes, partly because Antony is not here to reply.]




[I had again lost a pawn and we looked to be entering into at least the beginning of the end game as early as move 21, but little did we know ...]

[At this point it looked as good as over, with me now two pawns down and seemingly with little to hope for, but in fact we were still barely half way through the game.]


